A MESSAGE FROM THE PROSECUTOR

The law requires your child to attend school on a regular basis. If your child does not attend school regularly, there can be consequences for both your child and you. You and your child may be charged with a crime.

Perhaps more importantly, if your child does not attend school regularly, he or she will be robbed of the wonderful opportunities a full education can provide. Studies show that children who do not receive a full education are often unable to find meaningful employment and are more likely to abuse alcohol and drugs and to commit crimes.

I ask that you make sure your child attends school regularly. Everyone benefits when you help to secure your child's education.

KEEP YOUR CHILD IN SCHOOL

THE LAW

All children over the age of 6 and under the age of 18 must attend school regularly.



Habitual Truancy

- 5 or more consecutive unexcused absences
- 7 or more unexcused absences in a month
- 12 or more unexcused absences in a year

Chronic Truancy

- 7 or more consecutive unexcused absences
- 10 or more unexcused absences in a month
- 15 or more unexcused absences in a year

Excused Absences

Your child's school determines whether an absence is "excused."

Excused absences may include

- Illness or injury
- Illness or death in the family
- Funeral of immediate family member or close relative
- Religious holiday
- Medical and dental appointments
- Court appearances
- Pre-approved vacations
- Emergencies



Helping Your Child Succeed

- **Encourage good study habits.**
- Help with homework and/or arrange for a tutor, if necessary.
- Set achievable academic goals.
- Involve your child in extra-curricular activities.
- Recognize when your child does well and tell them how proud you are.



- Meet with your child's teachers and school officials -- get involved!
- Know when your child is absent from school.



- Teach your child that a good education is necessary to find and keep a good job.
- Identify and seek treatment for any drug or alcohol problems your child may develop.
- **Know** your child's friends and classmates.
